
### Ed-Co Newsletter November 2024

#### <u>News From Third Grade</u> <u>Mrs. Brady, Mrs. Bonert</u> <u>& Mrs. Augustyn</u>



We have been learning so much in third grade recently!

In Reading, we have been working with personal narratives. Students have been enjoying reading personal stories from authors and their classmates. They have found it fun to learn what is important to other people. We have also been learning about writing letters. We wrote a letter to our future selves about our hopes and dreams.

In Writing, we are working on a unit on writing personal narratives. Students chose a memory to write and share about with their class. We have also been learning about writing letters. We wrote a letter to our future selves about our hopes and dreams. We will begin learning about procedural writing next.

In Math, we have started learning about multiplication. We have learned a couple tricks and strategies to help us. Some of these strategies are skip counting, making arrays, repeated addition, making equal groups, and using a number line to make jumps. We have also been learning the properties of multiplication. Here are some examples:

**Commutative Property:** 3X4 = 4X3 The order that you multiply two numbers doesn't matter.

**Identity Property**: 1X7 = 7 Anything multiplied by one equals itself.

**Zero Property of Multiplication:** 0X7 = 0 Anything multiplied by zero equals zero.

**Distributive Property**: 7X8 = (7X4)+(7X4) You can break apart the factors.

**Associative Property**: 3X(2X2) = (3X2)X2 When the grouping of the factors is changed, the product stays the same.

In Social Studies, we have been learning about the Great Migration, when people were moving north across the country.

In science, we finished our unit about motion and matter. The students had fun learning about magnets, building carts, mixing materials such as sand and gravel. We also learned about reactions, such as baking soda and vinegar.

We are having a great year in third grade!

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<u>News from Mrs. Tegeler &</u> <u>Mrs. Allen</u> Our school weeks have been exciting! In science we learned about bats, spiders,



and the life cycle of a pumpkin. We are busy learning about communities and community helpers. We had a special visitor, Stone Allen. He is a Manchester police officer. We learned about the responsibilities and rewards of helping the community! We also took a walk around Colesburg to locate places of service. We have practiced nouns. ### FFA National Convention Oct. 22-25



Tuesday, Oct 22<sup>nd</sup>, seven Ed-Co FFA members, Zoe Walz, Miley Walz, Nolan Gaul, Tallen Mormann, Kara Knipper, Abby Bockenstedt, Dominic Davis along with chaperones Alicia Walz and

Matt Gaul hit the road bright and early for the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana! We traveled alongside Beckman Catholic, and our first stop was a great one—Cinnamon Ridge Dairy. This dairy is home to the top Jersey herd in the nation and has even had two "Cows of the Year" in their herd! We got an inside look at their impressive operation,

which has grown to include cheese-making of all kinds, including curds, block cheese, wheels, and even some Artisan cheeses in the works. Of course, we couldn't leave without sampling the cheese, and it did not disappoint!



After our tour, we enjoyed lunch at Cracker Barrel before heading to Indianapolis to get registered for the convention.

Day 2 of the National FFA Convention kicked off with an amazing tour of Ozark Fisheries, the longest-

running fish farm in the United States. Ozark Fisheries specializes in raising ornamental fish like koi and goldfish, which is a unique and fascinating side of agriculture that we don't often see in Northeast Iowa.

Aquaculture does have the big names like John Deere or Pioneer backing research, so they've had to be innovative, creating their own technology to improve their efficiencies and operation. One example we saw firsthand was the mats they invented to assist with hatching. They even find value in their nuisances, like crawfish and snapping turtles, which they also sell.

The numbers are staggering—they hatch around 120 million eggs each year and sell about 20 million fish annually. The tour was incredibly hands-on, and our members learned a ton about this cool sector of agriculture.



Thursday afternoon was filled with opportunities for Ed-Co FFA members as they spent time at the career fair, networking with ag businesses, exploring the latest in agricultural technology, and learning about post-secondary education options. Thanks to Three Hills Rodeo, the members were surprised with tickets to their rodeo performance that evening.

A special highlight from Friday moring was hearing from the legendary Temple Grandin. She shared her thoughts on the power of different thinkers – visual, mathematical, and verbal – and emphasized the importance of embracing unique abilities. As an autistic, visual thinker, she spoke about how her perspective has helped her succeed in construction and agriculture. Grandin challenged students to embrace their differences and encouraged educators to support visual thinkers, noting a need for more innovation here in the U.S. She left a powerful message: "Get those kids to the shop. Teach them to weld and let their visual minds work.

We wrapped up an incredible week at the National FFA Convention and heading back with inspiration, knowledge, and unforgettable memories! Here's what our members had to say about their experiences:

- 6. Leave your seat only between quarters, at half time and between games.


#### ANNUAL NOTICE OF NONDISCRIMINATION (Board Policy 102.E2)
