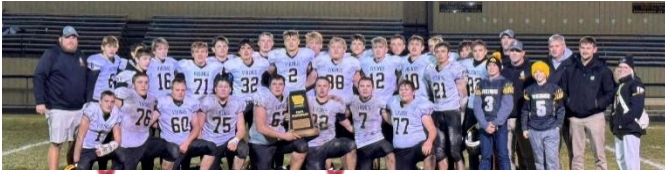

Elementary News



News From Mrs. Kruse

This month, we've been diving into long division, which can be a tricky skill, but with practice, students are making great strides! We encourage everyone to keep practicing their multiplication facts, as a strong foundation in multiplication makes division much easier. The more familiar students are with their times tables, the more confident they'll be in solving division problems.

In reading and writing, we are focusing on building strong claims and supporting them with solid evidence. This is an essential skill that helps students become clear and persuasive writers and thinkers.



Recently, we had an exciting field trip to the John Deere Museum and the Groat Museum, where students had the chance to explore continuity and change. The experiences and exhibits were perfect for sparking ideas for our end of the year social studies museum.



5th & 6th Grade Science News from Mrs. Schulte

Matter is everything and the fifth graders have been studying almost everything about matter! They have learned that matter has parts, matter has properties, and matter changes during physical and chemical changes. We have been doing a lot of hands-on work to explore the properties of matter including mass, volume, density, and solubility. Clues like bubbling, producing a gas, turning hot or cold, changing color, and producing a new substance have been evidence to see if a chemical change has happened to matter as students researched safe chemical changes. From blowing up a sandwich bag with the gas made from combining vinegar and baking soda to figuring out what items in mystery bags were based on their properties, students have a great understanding of matter and its properties. We use songs about atoms and matter to make the concepts fun. Matter is everything and we have been doing everything we can to make the learning of matter real, memorable, and applicable to our lives!



6th grade has been studying Properties and Conservation of Matter as well. They have collaborated on many chemical/physical change investigations including, blowing up a balloon with the chemical reaction between vinegar and baking soda, using the triple beam balances to understand conservation of matter after a chemical reaction occurs, etc. Next, we will begin our journey through the human body starting with the study of cells, tissues, organs, then body systems.



Special Education News from Mrs. Anderegg

There has always been a saying that we learn as we teach, and in my last few years of teaching, this is my strongest philosophy. In special education, I have learned that student motivation is key for success. Unfortunately, it is one thing I have found in special education that is lacking. The enthusiasm that comes with learning is something that is taught. I have learned that if I am motivated in my teaching, my students are more motivated to learn, and academic achievement is boosted! Here are some ways to help:

1. **Fill your child's world with reading.** Take turns reading with your child, or establish a family reading time when everyone reads her own book. Demonstrate how important reading is to you by filling your home with printed materials: novels, newspapers, even posters and placemats with words on them.
2. **Point out the new things you learn with enthusiasm.** Discuss the different ways you find new information, whether you're looking for gardening tips on the Internet or taking a night class in American literature.
3. **Ask about what he's learning in school, not about his grades or test scores.** Have him teach you what he learned in school today — putting the lesson into his own words will help him retain what he learned.
4. **Help your child organize her school papers and assignments so she feels in control of her work.** If her task seems too daunting, she'll spend more time worrying than learning. Check in with her regularly to make sure she's not feeling overloaded.
5. **Celebrate achievements, no matter how small.** Completing a book report calls for a special treat; finishing a book allows your child an hour of video games. You'll offer **positive reinforcement** that will inspire him to keep learning and challenging himself.
6. **Focus on strengths, encouraging developing talents.** Even if she didn't ace her math test, she may have written a good poem in English class. In addition to a workbook for math practice, give her a writing journal.

During this holiday season and in your future teachings, I encourage you to renew the joy in discovery. Learning CAN be fun!

Ms. Tara is wrapping up her 12-week long-term subbing for Mrs. Bonert. This 12-week period has been full of many adventures. The 3rd grade has gone on three field trips. We began our adventure to Plagman Barns to learn about the pioneer life. This fit nicely with our social studies units learning about the Westward Expansion, Lewis and Clark, and the different Native American's. The students were amazed at how different life was in the pioneer days. The next field trip was to Progressive Structures in Luxemburg to learn about the process of creating concrete. This fit into our science learning about reactions of mixing solids and liquids. During this trip, the students learned about the different aggregates used in the mixture of concrete to strengthen the end products. Each student was able to create their own concrete stone with gems. They also got to explore box culverts, intakes, and manholes all produced at the site.

The 3rd and final field trip of the 12 weeks was to listen to the Dubuque Symphony and Orchestra. This was a fantastic experience learning about the instrument families. The students were amazed at the different sounds demonstrated at the concert. We were presented with sound effects to songs from popular movies. This experience not only enhanced

the learning that had been studied in music class with Ms. Flint. But also, our current reading chapter, which is focusing on dramas and plays. The students are learning about how orchestras are an essential piece to providing the mood to the plays and movies, whether it's suspense to excitement.

We just wrapped up a lesson learning about the Baroque theaters from the 1600s to 1700s. These theaters used candles for their lighting and wood creations to make the sound effects for thunder, rain, and wind.
