when trying to plan a project, solution, etc. Part of the creative process is to research, which is what students are currently doing through exploring and trying different acrylic paint techniques through trial and error and using resources. Upon completion of their trials, they have to reflect on what they tried and discovered before they can start their final. When feedback is given throughout this process, students are asked specific questions about their piece to encourage creative and critical thinking which helps them make deeper connections to their learning and project. Look for these to be shared when they are done later in the quarter.

The high school art courses this semester are Digital Photography, Graphic Arts I/II, and Advanced Arts. The Digital Photography class is currently learning the basic information about using a DSLR camera and the composition rules used in photography. They will be completing projects within units that will be showcased on their electronic portfolios. Graphic Arts students are learning how to use Photoshop (I) and Illustrator (II) through completing lessons. They will then be applying their knowledge of the programs to create projects. There are four Advanced Arts students this semester that are all working on various projects. During Advanced Arts, they get to create things based on their interest. They learn how to create an electronic portfolio that displays their sketches, reflections, and photos of their projects. Keep your eyes out for their projects to be displayed and shared through Facebook.

An area that is growing in the art department is the focus of Graphic Design and Photography. These two areas of art provide skills that can be used in the workforce, other courses, and in students' personal lives. With the new studio coming in the addition of the school, we are dreaming big to increase students exposure to tools and resources that advance their knowledge in these areas. Therefore, grant writing is taking place to help pay for state of the art equipment for the students to use. We've been awarded the McElroy Grant thus far and we just got the equipment that this grant paid for. It's a 36" wide Canon Poster Printer and will have a specific home in the new classroom. This printer is able to print off of 36" rolled paper and smaller cut size paper. Students will be able to print their photographs on this printer on actual photograph

Ed-Co trio are finalists in Iowa State Bar Association Competition

Claire Aulwes, Marin Gaul, and Ava Steger of Edgewood-Colesburg, were named finalists in The Iowa State Bar Association's Young Lawyers Division "Know your Constitution" Project. Ninety-three finalists were selected from the more than 500 students across the State of Iowa who participated in the "Know Your Constitution" Project. The trio was honored at a luncheon in Des Moines on January 26th.



From the finalists, five students and their teachers will be chosen by a random drawing to receive scholarship grants and honoraria in recognition of their efforts.

The "Know Your Constitution" Project is designed to enrich students' understanding and appreciation of the Constitution. The students participating in the project were required to familiarize themselves with Constitution-related issues. A quiz was completed by each participating student. An essay question accompanied the quiz. This year's essay topic involved Constitutional questions concerning a

legislative proposal to raise the voting age in the U.S. to 21. The question is modelled after recent proposals floated by Presidential candidates. "Best Essay" finalists will be posted to the ISBA website (Know Your Constitution Program (iowabar.org)), with an overall winner announced during the Awards program.

The Know Your Constitution program is sponsored by The Iowa State Bar Association, with additional funding from the Iowa State Bar Foundation and IOLTA.

In reading, we have been learning about sequence-of- events and story elements. We have applied these two concepts into other areas of the day as well. We have been reading books in the realistic fiction genre. It is so important for students to read books in

different genres because they might try something new.

In writing, during November and December, we worked on creating a procedural text. With this style of writing, students explain step by step how to do something that they are an expert on. Once they were done, students presented their project to their peers. In January, we started working on informative writing. Students picked a topic to research, will write a report, and then present their project to their peers.
